


HAIRY THOROUGHWORT

Eupatorium pilosum

Located in bogs, wet sands and thickets in acid soils along the coast throughout the Division. Also known as Rough Boneset.

A perennial with rough or harshly hairy, unbranched stems; 0.5 to 1.5 m high. Lower and middle leaves opposite, oblong, egg-shaped or broadly lance-shaped, blunt or slightly pointed tip, rounded base, each margin with 3 to 12 course, blunt teeth; blades mostly 3 to 10 cm long and 1 to 4 cm wide. Upper leaves are smaller, often alternate, lance-shaped and mostly toothless. Clusters of individually indistinguishable, white flowers terminate stalks near the top of the stem, lower stalks frequently alternate; blooming in August and September.
