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CHAPTER 1:

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Department of Defense (DoD) Instruction 4715.3 and Army Regulation (AR) 200-4 require installations to develop an Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP) as an internal compliance and management tool that integrates the entirety of the cultural resources program with ongoing mission activities. For the purposes of compliance with the aforementioned directives, and to facilitate the implementation of historic preservation compliance actions by Fort Hunter Liggett (FHL). This document describes the FHL ICRMP, and is developed in response to requirements of AR 200-4, Sections 1-9(i), 4-1(c) to support the military mission and meet the legal compliance requirements of federal historic preservation laws and regulations in a manner consistent with the sound principles of cultural resources stewardship. This ICRMP establishes priorities for the identification and standards for the evaluation of historic properties within FHL, and provides a schedule designed to accomplish program objectives during a five-year period.

The central tenet of an ICRMP is mission support. The ICRMP must directly interface with the FHL mission, ensuring that mission essential activities are fully supported by the management policies and procedures outlined in the ICRMP. This ICRMP is based upon information derived from historical, archaeological, ethnographic, and architectural investigations, (including associated historical contexts), within FHL. It specifies management strategies for known historic properties and methodologies for identification and evaluation of unknown properties that the Cultural Resources Program (CRP) staff will follow in the identification, consultation, evaluation, treatment, reporting and management of all historic properties. This ICRMP also includes information about areas of FHL that have not yet been inventoried for historic properties and discusses plans for completion of the inventory, as well as provides guidance and procedures for the inadvertent discovery of human burials or archaeological sites.

All material and information in this ICRMP are intended to be used in conjunction with AR 200-4 and Department of the Army Pamphlet (DA PAM) 200-4.
